An Auroral Display—Presbyterian Synod in Cincinnati.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 24.—A magnificent auroral display was observed in this city and vicinity at 5 o'clock this morning, varying from north to east.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 24.—There was a splendid display of the aurora borealis here at 5 o'clock this morning. The sky, four degrees east of north, was a deep crimson, resembling the light of an immense fire....The Presbyterian Synod of Cincinnati met today. A report of the Committee on Propositions, to purchase the Ohio Female College, College Hill, was submitted. It involves the raising of \$100,000, one-half to Mr. HOLENSTATE, the owner, and the other half to the endowment of a Professorship. Resolutions looking to a more perfect union among Christians were adopted. The Synod will hold its next meeting at Springfield on the third Thursday of next October.

The National Capital Convention in Cincinnati—Arrival of Delegates.

CINCINNATI, Oct. 24.—Delegates are arriving for the Convention to consider the propriety of removing the national capital from Washington. L. O. REAVES, of Missouri; G. N. STEWART, of Alabama; C. G. FORCHY, of Texas, of the Executive Committee, have arrived, and a number of delegates are expected on the night trains. The Convention will be called to order to-morrow at noon, in Pike's Music Hall, by Judge CATON, of Illinois, President of the St. Louis Convention, should he arrive. Delegates have generally been appointed from all the States north, east, and west, and although the number here to-night is not large, a good convention is expected. A letter has been received by the Executive Committee from HORACE GREELEY. He expresses the opinion that if the subject be thoughtfully and carefully canvassed that a change will be approved and demanded. He thinks the place selected should be the focus of art, literature and refinement, thus inviting the presence and commanding the admiration of the choice spirits of the civilized world. He believes that New-York is pre-eminently that city, and that lone, quiet Washington is not.
